Course Description

This 3-credit course is an intermediate level course for students preparing for a career in healthcare and healthcare professionals involved in the care of clients. This course is designed to prepare caregivers to function in settings where communications skills are utilized to provide psychosocial support to dying persons and their families. We will discuss grief, loss, and issues related to end of life.

Prerequisites: None. This course should only be considered transferable as an elective.

Technical Requirements:

- 1. **Technical competence** required of students includes e-mail messaging, Blackboard navigation, downloads, attachments, word processing, and printing capabilities for handouts and other class materials.
- 2. **Computer hardware and software requirements** for this class includes desktop or laptop computer with capability for word processing (Microsoft Word preferred), internet access, audio and video media playback, and electronic messaging. The GCC library has computer access for students who may be unable to access the required technology.
- 3. Alternative procedures for submitting work in the event of technical breakdowns will require that students contact the professor and request an extension for the assignment deadline. The professor and student will establish a reasonable method for submitting work as needed.

Learning Outcomes (WECM)

The student will be able to:

Describe and discuss the end of life experience; demonstrate appropriate communication skills and concepts of interaction with the dying person and their family; and identify legal issues that impact end of life decisions.

General Course Objectives

The course objectives are based on the idea of "putting knowledge to work." A sound knowledge base in legal and ethical concepts and healthcare is incorporated with the Workplace Competencies and Foundation Skills identified as essential for good job performance by the Secretary's Commission on Achieving Necessary Skills (SCANS).

Methods of Instruction

Each unit of study will be defined as to the key terms, concepts & learning objectives. Since this is an Internet course, emphasis is placed on active, independent learning by the student. Students must assume responsibility for the completion of learning objectives in a timely manner.

Guided learning is provided by means of:

- 1. Online self-study learning modules and quizzes.
- 2. Online discussion questions and student discussion over subjects..
- 3. General guidance and support during the course of study.
