Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War/Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include: American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government.

Course Goals and Learning Outcomes: Course goals are linked to the required Core Curriculum Intellectual Competencies, Perspectives, and Exemplary Educational Objectives as defined by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. Specific core requirements are linked to the class schedule. Upon successful completion of this course, student should be able to:

- 1.) Create an argument through the use of historical evidence by using appropriate reading, listening, writing, and critical thinking skills.
- 2.) Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
- 3.) Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.
- 4.) Demonstrate an understanding of the social growth and development of the United States during this period.
- 5.) Demonstrate an understanding of the United States' role in a global society, both historically and as a prelude to for understanding both the present and the future.

Course Materials: Students must bring bluebooks and scantrons to each major exam and scantrons only to the reading quizzes. Pencils are also required in order to write on scantrons.

Grading: Your final grade in this course will be based on three (3) major exams that will count for 20 percent each (60 percent), (2) reading exams that will count for 10 percent of your grade each and (1) Historical Take Home Paper that will be worth 20 percent of your final grade. Grading on all these assignments will be based on a standard ten-point scale (A = 90-100, B = 80-89, C = 70-79, D = 60-69, and F = below 60); your final grade at the end of the semester will be the average of all tests and paper, also on the ten-point scale. The format of reading exams, major tests, and paper will be discussed in detail before each is given. Grades will be given in person and posted on canvas within a week of the assignment due date.

Make-ups: Make-ups for major tests or quizzes must be approved and arranged with the instructor prior to the date of the test or quiz and must be taken within a week of the missed assignment. The make-up tests may be in a different format than the original, this will be up to the instructor's discretion. There is NO make-up for the final exam.

Attendance Policy: Regular attendance for this class is absolutely essential in order to earn a good grade. This is the best way to learn the material and is unquestionably the easiest way to pass the course. That said, attendance is not required or an immediate determinant of the final grade in the class. Although attendance will be taken on a daily basis, it is for our record keeping purposes only; your grade at the end of the semester will not be lowered due to absences.
