ACNT2302, Accounting Capstone Internet Class.

Type of Course/Delivery Mode/Testing Requirements

Internet Class, delivered completely online. No on-campus testing required.

Course Pre-requisites, Co-requisites, and/or Other Restrictions

This course is the capstone course for the accounting program. Only students majoring in accounting (AAS) should complete this course. It should be completed in the students' last semester before graduation.

Course Description – from college catalog

Accounting Capstone—(3-0-3) Designed to provide a Capstone experience for the associate of applied science degree in accounting. A learning experience that allows students to apply broad knowledge of the accounting profession through discipline specific projects involving the integration of individuals and teams performing activities to simulate workplace situations.

Late Work Policy—A list of assignments and due dates is available in Canvas. All assignments are expected on or before the due date. Unless extreme circumstances are communicated to me before this date, late work will not be accepted.

Quizzes & Tests—No quizzes or tests will be given in this class.

Communication: Communication between the instructor and students will primarily be through the course site in GC Canvas. Frequent announcements, comments in the course discussions, responses to email, as well as feedback on homework assignments will be provided regularly. Students will primarily communicate with one another through the course discussions tool. Students will be required to post discussions on the Discussion Board.

Participation: In an online course, regular routine participation is extremely important. Online participation is assessed through a variety of methods including timely submission of assignments, posting on the Discussion Board, as well as logging in and checking the course site regularly.

Monitoring online activities: Online course activities will be monitored through a variety of methods including active participation by the instructor in various course areas as well as utilization of the Course Tracking tool in GC Canvas. The Course Tracking tool provides detailed statistics for each student for various activities in the course.

Technical Competence: Students are expected to have a basic understanding of personal computers, internet browsing, desktop applications such as Microsoft Word, and file management (uploading, downloading, or sending files).

Computer Software/Hardware requirements: Generally, personal computers purchased in the last 3 years should be adequate to access GC Canvas. Software requirements include Microsoft Internet Explorer 7.x or higher (www.microsoft.com), the latest version of Sun JAVA (www.java.com), the latest updates to your operating system (Microsoft Windows XP or higher or Apple MAC OS X or higher), and the latest updates to your anti-virus and spyware protection. Microsoft Excel and Access are also required for part of this course. Contact instructor for help in purchasing or accessing either of these programs for this class. Technical Breakdowns: Please do not wait until the last minute to submit assignments! Allow enough time before the due date and time to submit your assignments. Should there be a technical problem, immediately notify the instructor via external email or internal Canvas messages. Alternative arrangements, if permitted, will be discussed at that time.

On-campus meeting requirements: There will be no required on-campus meetings.

Academic Honesty: To ensure that each student is doing his or her own work, each assignment will be carefully graded and checked for duplication. If it is found that two students

have turned in duplicate assignments (which would indicate copying), both students will receive a grade of zero on that assignment on the first incidence. On the second incidence, the students will receive an F in the course.

Course & Instructor Policies

Class Attendance

Academic success is closely associated with regular classroom attendance and course participation. All successful students, whether on campus or online, are expected to be highly self-motivated. All students are required to participate in courses regularly and are obliged to participate in class activities and complete and submit assignments following their professors' instructions. Students taking courses during compressed semester time frames such as minimester, summer sessions, and mid-semester should plan to spend significantly more time per week on the course. Responsibility for work missed because of illness or school business is placed upon the student. More than two (2) absences are considered to be excessive. In addition, students' eligibility to receive financial aid or live in a College dormitory can be affected by withdrawal from courses. When withdrawal occurs, any tuition refund would be made in accordance with state regulations.

Attendance is not included as part of the grade in this course, but it will be taken each week and reported to the Admissions Office.

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Student Conduct & Discipline

Student conduct in this Internet class is expected to be the same as for a regular day class. Each student should always show respect and consideration for other students in the class and for the instructor.

Academic Integrity
