Study of juvenile justice process to include specialized juvenile law, role of the juvenile law, role of the juvenile courts, role of police agencies, role of correctional agencies, and theories concerning delinquency.

Methods of Evaluation:

Course & Instructor Policies:

Make-up exams will be given at instructor's discretion on a case-by-case basis. Late work is accepted only in special circumstances to be discussed in class. Attendance is important and grade may be lowered if student misses more than 2 meeting times throughout the semester. If you must be late or leave early, do so in a manner that does not disrupt the class.

Class Attendance:

Academic success is closely associated with regular classroom attendance and course participation. All successful students, whether on campus or online, are expected to be highly self-motivated.
