COURSE DESCRIPTION:

CSME 1310. Introduction to Haircutting and Related Theory (2-4-3) Introduction to the theory and practice of hair cutting. Topics include terminology, implements, section haircutting and finishing techniques. (96 contact hours)

Student Learning Outcomes:

The student will exhibit basic work place competencies related to haircutting and finishing techniques; identify terminology related to haircutting and finishing techniques; and demonstrate use of implements and various sectioning, haircutting and finishing.

- A. Describe why professional haircutting is a foundation for hair styling and other Services performed in the salon.
- B. The students will be able to demonstrate the proper use of scissors, razor, thinning Shears, clippers and other implements used in hair shaping.
- C. The student will be able to demonstrate the correct method of sectioning the hair prior to a haircut.
- D. The student will demonstrate the correct way to hold hair-cutting implements.
- E. Demonstrate the various techniques used in hair thinning.
- F. Demonstrate the basic cutting techniques with shears and razor.
- G. Discuss the use of clippers in hair shaping.

- H. Discuss and demonstrate the use of the razor in hair shaping.
- I. List definitions pertaining to hair shaping.
- J. Demonstrate procedures for giving basic medium length, long length, bob and short tapered cut using the precision method.
- K. Project a professional image.
- L. Identify organizes, plan and allocate resources.
- M. Experience the team concept and team skills by working with others on projects.
- N. Provide the student experience in acquiring and using information from a variety of sources.
- O. Use complex inter-relationship skills.
- P. Think creatively, make decisions, solve problems, visualize with the minds eye, reason, and how to acquire and apply new knowledge and skills.
- Q. Teach the student to apply the use of the computer systems in the cosmetology profession.
- R. Teach the importance of responsibility, self-esteem, social skills, self-management, integrity and honesty in personal life and in the work place.

Theory

Test is given on each unit of study. Students will work together on projects or individually. Theory is every week., review question and vocabulary will be checked each Monday.

Reading <u>Assignments</u>: Students are required to read the assigned chapters and complete the review questions and vocabulary on a weekly basis. The review questions and vocabulary will be checked each Monday

Assignments

All assignments for this course will be submitted electronically or on paper through Canvas and Mind tap. Assignments must be submitted by the given deadline. Turn in homework before leaving and on the same day of returning to school. Five (5) points will be taken off for each late assignment.

Make-up Test

All make-up tests will be the student's responsibility. Legal documentation must be brought by the student in order to permit a make-up test the day the student returns to school.

Turn work in using dates posted on Canvas and syllabus. You are responsible for your own classes, you must find out what classes you need and be sure you attend your class, THERE IS NO MAKE UP TEST FOR UN EXCUSED ABSENCES! YOU MUST PASS YOUR CLASSES

In order to be eligible to take your **State Board Licensing** test, you must pass all of your courses.

STUDENTS RESPONSIBILITY: Student's responsibility occurs when students take an active role in their learning by recognizing they are accountable for their academic success. The student is responsible for completing all assignments, quizzes, test, video, power point and activity. Now the follow-up decisions on whether to commit to doing the work could very well determine whether you end up working at a good paying job in a field you enjoy. Education involves a partnership that requires both students and instructors to do their parts. By entering into this partnership, you have a responsibility to show up for class, do the assignments and reading, be engaged and pay attention in class, follow directions, and put your best effort into it. You will get out of your experience here exactly what you put into it – nothing more and nothing less.

Class Attendance

School begins at 8:00 am for early morning, and 1:00 p.m. for High School Students. Students must attend theory class to receive personal service. 8:00am Day students will not be allowed to "clock-in" after 8:30 am, and High School students after 1:15 p.m. If you cannot make the late clock in time of 8:30, then you must wait until 12:00 pm not early or later. You only get two 12:00 clock-in a semester. This for emergencies only with a professional note. Do not abuse this. If absent more than thee (3) days before census date, you will be dropped a course.

The student should make a maximum effort to be present. The student will be responsible for the instruction missed due to absences. When classes are missed in pre-lab, the student will be required to make arrangements with the instructor for make-up demonstrations

(If a student accrues 3 or more unexcused absences, they will receive a failing grade for the course.)

Academic success is closely associated with regular classroom attendance and course participation.

All successful students, whether on campus or online, are expected to be highly self-motivated. All students are required to participate in courses regularly and are obliged to participate in class activities and complete and submit assignments following their professors' instructions. Students taking courses during compressed semester periods such as mini-mester, summer sessions, and mid-semester should plan to spend significantly more time per week on the course. Responsibility for work missed because of illness or school business is placed upon the student. More than two (2) absences are considered excessive. In addition, students' eligibility to receive financial aid or live in a College dormitory can be affected by withdrawal from courses. When withdrawal occurs, any tuition refund would be made in accordance with state regulations.

Attendance is very important for many reasons:

- 1. Missed instruction is hard to repeat.
- 2. Your hours are a part of your grade.
- 3. This is a clock hour program.
- 4. Missed hours must be made up.

Student Conduct & Discipline

The Counseling Statement is a written record of the verbal warning to identify behavioral incidents. **Your verbal warning is given at orientation**. Failure to attend orientation is grounds for dismissal from program. Instructors and students will sign this document and it will become a part of the student's file.

The Written Warning is an official notification that the student has demonstrated one or more areas of behavioral incidents that must be corrected. If a student has previously been issued a written warning, the second written warning will result in suspension from the program. The student is required to sign that he/she has received and read the written warning and understands its contents. The written warning will be placed in the student's file. THE NEXT SUPSENSION IS FROM THE PROGRAM. A STUDENT MUST SIT OUT UNTIL THE NEXT SEMESTER TO RE-ENROLL.

Dismissal from Program – The student who has received:

- 1. Verbal Warning.
- 2. Written Warning will go home for the day
- 3. Second written warning goes home for two days
- 4. Three days suspension for third write up and if incident continues dismissal from program.

Appearance

- 1. Look Professional.
- 2. Female students are required to have their hair done and make-up on <u>before</u> clocking in.
- 3. Male student will be appropriately groomed before clocking in.
- 4. Students will not put on make-up or style their hair on school time.
- 5. No hats, caps, or doo rags

Dress code

- 1. Black scrubs only
- 2. No undershirts, other than black or white. No hooded shirts or jackets. No sweaters or jackets other than black or white.
- 3. Jeans must be BLUE, hemmed and have no holes, or worn spots.
- 4. No open toes, side or heels and no holes in shoes. TENNIS SHOES ONLY
- 5. Face mask (cloth)

Cell Phones

- 1. No cell phones are allowed.
- 2. If an instructor sees or hears a cell phone for any reason then you will be written up.
- 3. You must clock out to use your phone for any reason, even an emergency.
- 4. Desk phone can be used, no personal calls unless it is an emergency and you must be off the clock

Academic Integrity

The faculty expects from its students a high level of responsibility and academic honesty. Because the value of an academic degree depends upon the absolute integrity of the work done by the student for that degree, it is imperative that a student demonstrate a high standard of individual honor in his or her scholastic work.

Students who are caught submitting plagiarized material or who have engaged in collusion on any course assignment or exam will receive a zero on the first assignment and an "F" in the course for any additional acts of academic dishonesty. Students who are caught cheating on any course assignment or exam will receive an "F" in the course.
