Course Description

Methods of Instruction:

Text reading, concept videos, discussions, and online coursework assignments/quizzes.

- SPECIAL NOTE: Within MINDTAP there are practice activities and videos.
- The Activity at the beginning of the Chapters is called Start: Myth or Reality?
- Videos are called Watch: Concept Clips at the end of the chapters.

These are **practice** activities where you can acquire EXTRA CREDIT points. They are not difficult and do not take a lot of time. The Myth or Reality activity is interesting from a psychological aspect and the short videos reiterate a specific concept.

Methods of Evaluation

Grades will be determined as follows:

Grades will be posted online within CANVAS. As Grades are posted by Canvas auto-grading or by myself you will be able to SEE what your grade is for the course. Any missed assignments or blanks will be filled in with zeros and will greatly affect your grade. Pay attention!

Quizzes (40% of total grade) Canvas has a running average column of quiz grades

• Quizzes will be taken ONLINE thru CANVAS and will cover 1-2 chapters of the text.

• After covering a chapter or two, the quiz will be available for you to take ONLINE. Open book but Quizzes can be taken only ONCE. It is TIMED. It cannot be "made up" or taken more than once.

Journal Assignments (30% of total grade) Canvas has a running average column of journal assignment grades

• Several journal writing assignments are due throughout the semester. Each assignment will correspond with topics in chapters. The journal writing should be **substantive and insightful** and at **LEAST a page in length**. You will be reflecting on YOUR own thoughts, emotions, feelings, and YOUR life. You should have several paragraphs and maybe pages of typed responses. You may either submit in the text box or attach your responses (late work accepted but with a grade deduction depending on QUALITY and HOW late the assignment).

Discussions: (10% of total grade) Canvas has a running average column of discussion grades.

There will be a discussion for each week, and you are required to give SUBSTANTIVE comments (300+ words) and then RESPOND (300+ words) to one or more classmates. Please Note! – there will be DUE DATES for the discussions and subsequent responses. I WILL deduct points for not participating, for late responses and/or not replying to another student. YOU must actively participate EACH week.

Adjustment Paper (10% of total grade)

Students will interview an individual (not themselves) who has undergone a life adjustment of significance and write a four to five page research paper in APA format regarding the type of adjustment. At least 3 references must be cited. I have given you an Example paper, as well as directions located ON the assignment, and a short video - these are located in the LAST MODULE.

FINAL: (10% of course grade)

The Final test will be comprehensive, open book test, timed and available at the end of the term and due no later than the last day of the course.

LATE WORK is accepted but deductions made for each day that an assignment is submitted late.

What counts as attendance?

Students can be counted for attendance on any given day if they do one of the following: Student makes a post to a class discussion. Student submits a written assignment or project via file upload. Student takes a quiz or exam. Student submits work through a third party software such as Pearson or McGraw Hill, and the grade is transferred to the LMS Gradebook. An e-mail from

the student showing that the student initiated contact with a faculty member to ask a question about the academic subject studied in the course.

Beware! It is possible to pass all tests in the class and FAIL the course because of failure to **participate with the discussions or do the journal assignments.**

Attendance Policy:

Academic success is closely associated with regular classroom attendance and course participation.

All successful students, whether on campus or online, are expected to be highly self-motivated.

Academic Integrity

The faculty expects from its students a high level of responsibility and academic honesty. Because the value of an academic degree depends upon the absolute integrity of the

work done by the student for that degree, it is imperative that a student demonstrate a high standard of individual honor in his or her scholastic work.

Scholastic Dishonesty, any student who commits an act of scholastic dishonesty is subject to discipline. Scholastic dishonesty includes but is not limited to cheating, plagiarism, collusion, the submission for credit of any work or materials that are attributable in whole or in part to another person, taking an examination for another person, any act designed to give unfair advantage to a student or the attempt to commit such acts.

Plagiarism is a form of scholastic dishonesty involving the theft of or fraudulent representation of someone else's ideas or words as the student's original work. Plagiarism can be intentional/deliberate or unintentional/accidental. Unintentional/Accidental plagiarism may include minor instances where an attempt to acknowledge the source exists but is incorrect or insufficient. Deliberate/Intentional plagiarism violates a student's academic integrity and exists in the following forms:

Turning in someone else's work as the student's own (such as buying a paper and submitting it, exchanging papers or collaborating on a paper with someone else without permission, or paying someone else to write or translate a paper),

Recycling in whole or in part previously submitted or published work or concurrently submitting the same written work where the expectation for current original work exists, including agreeing to write or sell one's own work to someone else,

Quoting or copy/pasting phrases of three words or more from someone else without citation,

Paraphrasing ideas without citation or paraphrasing incompletely, with or without correct citation, where the material too closely matches the wording or structure of the original,

Submitting an assignment with a majority of quoted or paraphrased material from other sources, even if correctly cited, when original work from the student is expected,

Copying images or media and inserting them into a presentation or video without citation,

Using copyrighted soundtracks or video and inserting them into a presentation or video without citation,

Giving incorrect or nonexistent source information or inventing source information,

Performing a copyrighted piece of music in a public setting without permission,

Composing music based heavily on someone else's musical composition.

Infractions may result in disciplinary options on behalf of the faculty member and/or dean.
