Course Description

Psyc 2301 is the introductory course to psychology, scientific methods in psychology, survey of different fields of psychology, abnormal behavior, personality development, therapies, applied psychology, emotions, motivation, the nervous system, and the learning process.

Critical Thinking, Communication, Empirical & Quantitative Skills, and Social Responsibility.

Student Learning Outcomes

- The student will be able to identify the contributions of various psychologists to the material appropriate to this course.
- The student will be able to explain the scientific method by developing a simple experiment using the terminology that describes the variables used in the experiment.
- The student will identify and recognize the complexity of sociocultural and international diversity.

Students will access and/or purchase the text via CANVAS (Grayson's Learning Management System LMS) and your instructor's course.

Go to your course/Modules and click on any Cengage content and follow the instructions. You will either enter the access code you purchased OR pay for access to the online text and content when you sign up. There should also be an option to order a hard copy of the text at an additional charge if you want it.

Quizzes will be taken ONLINE and will cover chapters of the text.

Quizzes will be available for you to take ONLINE outside of class. It will only be available for a certain number of days so pay attention to due dates. It cannot be "made up". If you miss taking the quiz – your grade is a zero for that quiz. There will be no make-ups!

Tests (Midterm and Final) (20% of total grade)

There will be two TESTS – Midterm and a Final.

Midterm will cover first half of semester and is taken in CANVAS.

The Final will cover the second half of text chapters and is taken in CANVAS.

Response Journal Assignments – (35% of total grade)

Several journal type response Writing assignments are due this semester. These assignments will be topics where you will write a response, reflection paper about a video clip, article or topic that I have chosen. These papers are your own thoughts, reactions, opinions, and analysis of the assignment. They will not be shared with the class. Specific directions for each will be located WITH the assignment itself. I will count off for late submissions. Each assignment should be at least a page + in length or approximately 350 words, several paragraphs. Due dates are on timetable and/or with the assignment within the folder for that week.

Discussions - (15% of total grade)

Several discussion topics will be posted throughout the semester located within the module/week it is due. Students must participate! This is an asynchronous discussion. Students will RESPOND to the discussion prompt (300+ words) and then REPLY to another student's initial response (300+ words). Discussion threads will stay open and active throughout the course. These discussions are designed for students to dialogue and interact with each other much like a face-to-face course. PLEASE be respectful of other's opinions and views. Your instructor will be able to monitor EVERY response and reply. Responses should be SUBSTANTIVE – no one sentence responses or replies will count! I count off if late, no replies, or too short or not answering the prompt correctly.

Methods of Instruction

Several chapters of your text will be covered in this class through online text readings, handouts, videos, etc. A variety of learning methods will be utilized and student engagement will be emphasized.

Outline of Topics Covered

The subject of human behavior content ranges from strict biology to complex social interactions between individuals. We will be covering a wide range of theories on many aspects of human behavior.

Attendance Policy:

Academic success is closely associated with regular classroom attendance and course participation.

All successful students, whether on campus or online, are expected to be highly self-motivated.

Academic Integrity

The faculty expects from its students a high level of responsibility and academic honesty. Because the value of an academic degree depends upon the absolute integrity of the work done by the student for that degree, it is imperative that a student demonstrate a high standard of individual honor in his or her scholastic work.

Scholastic Dishonesty, any student who commits an act of scholastic dishonesty is subject to discipline. Scholastic dishonesty includes but is not limited to cheating, plagiarism, collusion, the submission for credit of any work or materials that are attributable in whole or in part to another person, taking an examination for another person, any act designed to give unfair advantage to a student or the attempt to commit such acts.

Plagiarism is a form of scholastic dishonesty involving the theft of or fraudulent representation of someone else's ideas or words as the student's original work. Plagiarism can be intentional/deliberate or unintentional/accidental. Unintentional/Accidental plagiarism may include minor instances where an attempt to acknowledge the source exists but is incorrect or

insufficient. Deliberate/Intentional plagiarism violates a student's academic integrity and exists in the following forms:

Turning in someone else's work as the student's own (such as buying a paper and submitting it, exchanging papers or collaborating on a paper with someone else without permission, or paying someone else to write or translate a paper),

Recycling in whole or in part previously submitted or published work or concurrently submitting the same written work where the expectation for current original work exists, including agreeing to write or sell one's own work to someone else,

Quoting or copy/pasting phrases of three words or more from someone else without citation,

Paraphrasing ideas without citation or paraphrasing incompletely, with or without correct citation, where the material too closely matches the wording or structure of the original,

Submitting an assignment with a majority of quoted or paraphrased material from other sources, even if correctly cited, when original work from the student is expected,

Copying images or media and inserting them into a presentation or video without citation,

Using copyrighted soundtracks or video and inserting them into a presentation or video without citation,

Giving incorrect or nonexistent source information or inventing source information,

Performing a copyrighted piece of music in a public setting without permission,

Composing music based heavily on someone else's musical composition.

Infractions may result in disciplinary options on behalf of the faculty member and/or dean.
